



Department Highlights

Clerk's Office and Department of Administrative Services

- Completed several capital fund projects including:
 - Front entrance ramp renovation to adhere to updated ADA compliance standards - meeting the needs of all residents.
 - A lobby renovation with added seating, a face-forward security desk and updated bathrooms to current ADA compliance.
 - Conversion to LED smart lighting.
 - Added solar panels to save not only electrical billing but reduce our carbon footprint.
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 - o Renovated the elevator to more reliable current technology.
- Made improvements to current signage with the addition of several digital signs in cooperation with the Community Relations Department to increase visibility of events, closures and more.
- Processed 13,275 new passports and passport renewals, generating \$151,256. The Office also completed 312 notaries and 49 Freedom of Information Act requests.

Assessor's Office

- Assisted 2,421 residents file residential appeals remotely and in-person for Cook County Assessor and the Cook County Board of Review appeal periods.
- Hosted evening hours during property tax appeal periods and assisted 31 residents.
- 116 residents attended Township of Schaumburg Appeal Seminar, hosted by Assessor Lawson and Cook County Board of Review Commissioner George Cardenas, on October 23.
- 678 exemption applications filed from February May 2023: Homeowners, Senior Citizen/Senior Freeze, Veterans, and Persons with Disability.
- 455 residential permits (for home renovations) filed with Cook County from our six municipalities.

Community Relations

- Launched an Instagram account, expanding our reach and relevancy to the community.
- Added an additional issue of the Town Crier to the annual schedule, publishing five issues instead of four.
- Hosted community events and also collaborated with several local partners such as the Juneteenth Planning Committee, Village of Schaumburg, Village of Hoffman Estates, School District 54, Children's Home and Aid, Hoffman Estates Police Department, Village of Hanover Park, Schaumburg Township District Library and more.





• Improved website accessibility with new tools to address issues impacting people with visual and other impairments.

Department of Transportation

- Transported 20,000 residents.
- Township Riders Initiative Program (TRIP) transported 700 residents to hospitals in the downtown area.
- Purchased four electric buses and began planning for charging stations on our parking lot.



Welfare Services

• \$98,989.19 (73 households) was issued through General Assistance and Emergency Assistance grants, to help support our residents who were experiencing a hardship such as

a utility shut off, eviction and/or foreclosure.

- 13,079 households utilized the food pantry, supporting 39,335 individuals.
- 5,828.50 volunteer hours were tracked to support the amazing programming and services the department provided for the community.
- 3,166 resources/referrals were shared with Township residents. Casework staff work with thousands of residents who reach out for support to meet basics needs, sometimes Township programs are available and sometimes a resource and/or referral for outside assistance is shared.





Mental Health Board

- Completed a community needs assessment.
- Conducted hearings for agency grant applications.
- Arranged for a free Narcan dispenser at the Township in partnership with the Kenneth Young Center.





Kenneth Young Center

- 504 child and adolescent clients served through 10,866 hours of behavioral health care.
- 433 adult clients served through 9,855 hours of behavioral health care.
- Weekly youth empowerment programs to develop young leaders and create brave spaces specific to LGBTQ+ youth.

Community Health Nurse

- Grew attendance to the popular Walking Group 117% on every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.
- Launched programing for the Deaf Community including a Diabetes support group once a month with 10-15 participants and health lectures once a month with 10-15 participants.
