## Paint-A-Thon Applications Due July 1

Does the exterior of your home need to be painted? Consider applying for the Annual Paint-A-Thon program! To qualify, homes must be owned and occupied by adults aged 60 and older, people with disabilities or veterans of any age. There are income and asset limits, but all are encouraged to apply. Once a home is determined to be eligible, volunteer groups are matched to do the scraping, priming and painting of the exterior of the home. There is no cost to the homeowner. Current homeowners insurance is required. Applications are due July 1. Paint-A-Thon is also a major volunteer event and we're always looking for teams of volunteers! Volunteers must be at least 16 years old.

# MENTAL HEALTH CARE IS FOR EVERYONE

Mental illness is so widespread that it is likely nearly everyone in the United States has been affected in some way. How is this possible? The National Alliance Against Mental Illness' (NAMI)\* statistics can shed light on the current mental health reality:

- 1 in 5 U.S. adults experiences mental illness each year
- 1 in 20 U.S. adults experiences serious mental illness each year
- 1 in 6 U.S. youth, aged 6 17, experiences a mental health disorder each year
- 50% of all lifetime-mental illness begins by age 14 and 75% by age 24
- Suicide is the 2<sup>nd</sup> leading cause of death among people aged 10 - 14

Navigating the world of mental illness can be daunting. Family members can be left wondering where to go for help and those with mental illness can be too ill or unable to self-advocate. Insurance issues, language barriers, stigma and long wait lists can also block access to treatment.

The Mental Health Board is charged with granting funds to agencies that help those with mental illness, substance use disorders and developmental/intellectual disabilities. Support from the Mental Health Board should increase opportunities for care for our neighbors in need. This fiscal year, the Mental Health Board will provide grant funding to 33 programs in 23 agencies.

# COMMUNITY PAPER SHRED EVENT JUNE 7

Join us for a free paper shred event for Township residents on June 7 from 8 - 11 am or until the trucks are full at One Illinois Blvd, Hoffman Estates. This is a paper shredding event only – no electronics. Paper shredding is limited to four boxes or paper bags per person (1 cubic ft. or 15" x 12" x 10"). No plastic bags please. Boxes must be unsealed. Paper clips, binder clips and rubber bands must be removed.

Shredding should be limited to sensitive paperwork only - advertisements, catalogs, envelopes, etc. can be recycled at home.

We ask that participants enter our parking lot heading southbound on Illinois Blvd. so as not to block traffic on Schaumburg Road. # PROPERTY EXEMPTIONS FOR TAX YEAR 2024 (IN 2025)

Visit the Assessor's Office to verify that your tax year 2024 property tax exemptions were properly applied before the second installment is mailed later this summer. All new residents who would like to apply for the Homeowner's, Veterans with Disabilities, or Persons with Disabilities exemptions may visit our office to see if they qualify and to apply.

Please note, if you submitted a Certificate of Error for any exemption after July 1, 2024, your exemption may not automatically renew. Please call or visit our office with any questions.

### SENIOR CITIZEN AND SENIOR FREEZE RECIPIENTS

Township residents who were born in 1959 or earlier may qualify for the Senior Citizen and/or Senior Freeze exemptions. Senior Freeze exemptions have income requirements, which must be verified with federal (1040) income tax documents from the prior tax year. Township staff can help seniors apply and suggest you call 847-285-4569 before coming to the office if you are unsure what documents to bring. Senior Freeze exemptions must be renewed annually per state law. However, Senior Citizen exemptions are automatically renewed annually. Contact the Assessor's office to find out more information at 847-285-4569.
